Free public access

By providing a free opportunity to read a book, you can work to make sure that no child in Gunnison

County is falling behind on reading over the summer months.

For the last two years, your support

has allowed us to partner with the Crested Butte Library to offer StoryWalk® to the community, for free. A children's picture

book is deconstructed, and each page is displayed along the wide path of the Lower Loop. Children move through meadows and forests, reading each page as they come to it The walk is short and easy, allowing kids to enjoy a story and explore their natural surroundings at the same time.

Nothing beats nature

All parents know that hiking with young children can be quite a challenge. But the long-term rewards are worth it. Spending time in nature has been shown to increase attention span, reduce stress, and help kids stay active and fit. When kids connect to nature at a young age, they

are much more likely to develop a conservation ethic and love for the land. They are more likely to grow up to protect these places that you love.

Adriana Bombard is a busy mother of two. She and her family were visiting Crested Butte last summer when they stumbled upon the StoryWalk®. "It was great for our kids, who are between the ages of three and five," she said. "They ran from page to page, and it made hiking with them really easy."

By providing a free opportunity to read a book and connect with the natural landscape, you ensure that kids like Adriana's grow up to be the next generation of conservationists.

Wildlife and flooding WILDW WETLANDS WORK FOR YOU



t's a quiet, brisk morning in late April. Temperatures have been warm, and the snow in the mountains above is melting quickly. The Slate River is rushing and churning, filled to the brim and spilling over.

If you live in the town of Crested Butte, you might be worried about spring flooding.

You might be worried, but you shouldn't be.

The Slate River wetlands just north of town are nature's sponge. As the river spills over its banks, the willows and rich, loamy soil of the wetlands expand, absorbing the excess water, and assuaging your worries of flooding.

Did vou know?

In addition to natural flood control, there are so many ways that the Slate River wetlands work for you.

They provide a haven of biodiversity. From birds and beavers to elk and deer, the wetlands are teaming with life. Great Blue Herons collect willow branches to build rookeries in nearby trees, hatching and raising their young just outside of town.

The area also offers great opportunities for stand up paddle boarding and kayaking. In 1991, the Land Trust's first project ever was protecting a section of the Slate River wetlands. It's no wonder why.

Today, the Land Trust continues to enhance and protect these wetlands through habitat improvement projects like saving Peanut Lake and replacing the Gunsight Bridge.

your impact FROM TOXIC TO TREASURE

f you're looking carefully, you might spot a beaver popping her head up out of the clear, cool water. Great blue herons pick their way along the shore, and the shadows of willow bows fall across the meandering river.

The Slate River Valley is a peaceful scene these days, full of wildlife and the occasional boater. Later in the summer, cows will graze along the sloping valley walls. But the valley didn't always look this way.

Once upon a time...

Back in the mining days, this was the stage for a roaring operation. A railroad track blazed down the southern shore of Peanut Lake. Coal was stacked and loaded onto cars. Silver ore was milled just below the Peanut Mine, producing oozing pools of bright orange and red sludge.

It must have been guite the scene. Unfortunately, you didn't have to be alive 100 years ago to picture it. None of the waste from the operation was cleaned up.

By the early 2000s, the network of trails that take off just upstream of Peanut Lake had become popular for hiking and biking. Now "The entire community known as the Lower Loop, these trails were almost the perfect place to take your kids or your dog. Almost.

restored land." To access the Lower Loop, you had to cross through the toxic mining waste left from the Peanut Mine. Parents kept a close watch on their children and their dogs as they passed through. Ranchers didn't like to let their cattle graze in the area.

Finally, the coal and silver ore next to the Lower Loop spontaneously combusted. Through the smoke of that fire, the community knew that enough was enough.

Something had to be done

Sandy Leinsdorf grew up on a ranch outside of Crested Butte, where her family has been ranching since the late 1800s. She has long blond hair and a welcoming smile.

Talking to Sandy, you can tell she **Before:** has fierceness behind her convictions.

She was the president of the Land Trust on the day the coal and silver ore caught fire. With the strength of the entire community behind her, Sandy and the Land Trust board set out to clean up the Peanut Mine.

The power of a community

The plan was straight-forward. A layered combination of limestone, coal and silver refuse, and an earthen cap would reclaim the mine. Water would be cleaned as it trickled down through the limestone.

About 50,000 cubic yards of coal and silver waste were cleaned up. That is the equivalent of over 53,000 hot tubs full of refuse.

with so much support. "Everyone was in," she says.

Butterflies and birds now share the airspace above the reclamation, and it's easy to spot the cottontail rabbits that live on the hillside. Ranchers graze their cattle without worry, and kids are free to run around and be kids.

You can still tell where the mine tailings lie, a subtle reminder of the power we have to destroy our home. When we come together as a community, we also have the power to clean it up.

Vises and values FINDING YOUR COMMUNITY IN SERVICE

Margery Feldberg's family came to the Gunnison Valley forty-four years ago. Like so many, they came for the world-class skiing, but they stayed for the views and the vibe of this little mountain town.

The vibe is here to stay

"The vibe in CB is a singular thing. It's about being low key, it's about placing a priority on the outdoors, it's about being effective at what you do while not taking yourself too seriously, and it's especially about being fun-loving," Margery said.

Margery knew that the vibe of Crested Butte wasn't in any danger of changing. But she worried that the iconic views around town were not all protected.

They could disappear.

"As a second homeowner, there are only so many ways that I can contribute. I can't vote here, and I can't sit on town council," she

said. "I saw getting involved with the Land Trust as a way that I could defend what I cherish about this place."

Finding her community

Margery joined the Land Trust board, served two terms, and now serves as a committee member. Her twin experience as both a real estate developer and as a small-scale rancher has informed her service at the Land Trust. She's still learning the ranching trade; this month, she'll be learning cattle branding with local ranchers, and bringing that knowledge back to her

ranching operation in Connecticut.

"I think there's one thing that really unites everyone in the valley," she

> said. "People's willingness to adhere to their values, to relentlessly defend the things they hold dear. That is so much stronger here than

other places I've been." By helping to protect the views she loves through her service to the Crested Butte Land Trust, Margery has found herself able to contribute.

"I think my love of CB is notable for how typical it is rather than how different it is," she said. "Our love of vibe and our devotion to protecting what we value unites us in this valley."






